POWER READING 2023 – 2024

(rev. 8-7-23)

Students must read at least one book each month from the selected genres below. Afterward, they may read other appropriate literature with their teacher's approval or work on their project. A short book report will be written for the 1st Power Reading book completed each month within the genre indicated below. Students who do not have a book to read at school each day will be assigned a book as well as an additional book report. A silent sustained reading period is scheduled each day after lunch.

Each child should maintain several Power Reading books at school at all times. Novels should be quality literature and age-appropriate. Picture books are appropriate for non-readers and early readers. Adolescent romance and excessively violent texts are not appropriate for the school environment. Also excluded are "choose your own ending," informational, and cartoon/graphic novels. Approval of any book is at the teacher's discretion.

Visit your Public Library frequently and regularly. Children are more interested in reading when provided with the opportunity to browse and preview books before selecting. The familiarity gained by using local libraries is a valuable asset for many high school and college courses.

Choose several events from your book to include as "news stories." Arrange the page in a newspaper layout with headlines, color pictures, and captions. Include a name for your newspaper that represents your book.
October	MULTI-CULTURAL MYTHS & FOLK TALES Early Elementary: European origin Upper Elementary: Other multi-cultural origin Pre High School: Japanese origin	COSTUME & SPEECH: Create a homemade costume of the main character in your book and prepare to tell the story from their point of view. ~ PLEASE COVER BOOK PRIOR TO BRINGING IT TO SCHOOL TO KEEP YOUR CHARACTER IDENTITY A SECRET~
November	Early American HISTORICAL FICTION (taking place up to through the 1800s)	CARTOON: Fold a piece of 12" x 18" paper into 8 panels (9" x 12", 4 panels for Early Elem) – 1st panel should contain title and author. Remaining panels should depict plot.
December	FANTASY (no Rick Riordan for gr. 5 - 8)	TRAVEL BROCHURE: Prepare a travel brochure for the place in which your story takes place. Use letter-sized paper folded into thirds. Design a cover for the travel brochure with the name of your story's location. Highlight the different attractions and sights. Cover must be fully colored. Include a colored drawing inside for each attraction.
January	ADVENTURE (no Rick Riordan for grades 5 - 8)	BOOK JACKET: A folded piece of paper that fits the book, has an illustration, title, and author on the front and an original synopsis on the back – entire cover should be colored
February	BIOGRAPHY & AUTOBIOGRAPHY	MOSAIC: Draw a simple outline of the person and use small pieces of paper to "color" the picture. Pieces can be a variety of shapes, or challenge yourself to use one shape only.
March	TRADITIONAL CLASSICS (i.e. Huckleberry Finn, not Harry Potter)	BOOK POSTER: Should include title, author, and an important scene from the book that "tells a story" on 12" x 18" (9" x 12" for Early Elem.) paper. The goal is to advertise your book. Review movie posters if you need ideas.
April	REAL ANIMAL: Grades K - 5 A story about an animal that behaves like an animal (e.g. Black Beauty, not Clifford) SCIENCE FICTION: PHS	STORY CUBE: A paper-covered Kleenex or shoe box which has scenes from story drawn on each side - one side should include title and author of book and each panel should be completely colored
May / June	CALDECOTT AWARD Non-readers through beginning readers	Story Telling Day project – timeline will be passed out in class and worked on in school
	NEWBERY AWARD (gold or silver medal) Independent readers
